



Today, it's the Dordogne River that passes in front of the old village of Bourg. However in the past, in the Middle Ages, the Ambès beak which is the place where the Garonne River and the Dordogne River meet was much more remote. The village was in front of the estuary of Gironde. Over the years, the Bec d'Ambès moves forward because of natural phenomenon such as the tide for example.




